Issues relating to O.P.E.C. discussed: full accord

A meeting was held yesterday morning between Sayid Mohammed Salman, the Minister of Oil, Sayid Ahmed Zaki Yemani, the Minister of Oil and Mining in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and Dr. Perez Alfonso, the Venezuelan Minister of Mines and hydro-carbonics. The meeting went on for two hours and a half. The Venezuelan Minister had arrived in Baghdad on Sunday night while the Saudi Minister arrived yesterday morning.

Cobalt unit TECHNICAL COMMITTEE NAMED

The Economic Planning Board has approved the formation of the Permanent Technical Committee whose task will be to supervise the implementation of the project of the cobalt unit for radioactive therapy.

The committee has for its Chairman the Secretary General of the Atomic Energy Commission. The other members are: the Director General of Industrial Buildings or any other engineer specialised in industrial buildings as delegated by the Minister of Industry; two physicians nominated by the Ministry of Health and a representative from the Ministry of Planning.

The site of this project is situated near Al-Salam Hospital in Baghdad. The project involves the construction of a four-storey building supplied with all apparatuses for the diagnoses and treatment of malignant tumours. A two-storey wing is also to be constructed connecting the main building with Al-Salam Hospital and containing 150 beds.

The purpose of this project is to set up a centre of therapy where protection is afforded against radio activity. The centre will also offer direct services to the people by diagnosing and applying treatment of cancerous diseases. This will mean considerable savings in the amounts of money spent on obtaining treatment abroad. This vital project is expected to be completed in 1965.

IMPERIALISM IN DEATH PANGS

— LEADER

LEADER ABDUL KARIM QASSIM, THE PRIME MINISTER AND C-IN-C. OF THE ARMED FORCES, HAS EMPHASISED THAT IMPERIALISM WAS NOW IN THE PANGS OF DEATH AND WAS HEADING FOR ITS INEVITABLE DOOM.

The Leader also stated that the future was for the struggling peoples who had faith in the justness of their principles and the uprightness of their sublime objectives.

The Faithful Leader was speaking to a representative of Al-Ahd al Jadid daily of Baghdad. The statements of the Leader appeared in yesterday's issue of that paper.

The Leader had referred to the plots made by imperialism against the immortal Iraq Republic, the latest of which was the American imperialist attempt to blow up the oil pipe lines near Kirkuk last August. He went on to say that imperialism had brought a group to blow up those pipelines. "But we have defeated and crushed that plot."

The Leader further disclosed that it was CAT Company, run by Emille al-Bustani (a Lebanese Deputy) which undertook the plot backed by the imperialistic espionage and sabotage network.

Following are the verdicts passed by the First Martial Court in the case of the attempt to blow the oil pipelines near Kirkuk which took place some months ago. The court sentenced to death the criminals Nayif Hamarna; Mohammed Ahmed Ali; Hanna Samuel; Ibrahim Hamim; Ali al-Sayid Karim; and Mansur Lewis and the fugitives

Shukri Hanna Shamas; Fahram Francisian, Emile al-Bustani and Lewis Awad. They were all sentenced under Para (A), article 11 and Article 7/12 of the Amended Baghdad Penal Code. The sentences were passed in court with respect to those present and in absentia in respect to the fugitives.

The death sentence passed on the criminals Ali al-Sayid Karim, and the fugitive criminals Shukri Shammass, Fahram Francisian, Emile al-Bustani and Lewis Awad have been commuted to penal servitude for life under Article 1 of the Baghdad Penal Code.

These were not present at the place of the commission of the crime. So their acts were not on a par with those of the actual culprits. The period of the detention of the criminal Ali al-Sayid Karim is to be counted.

The death sentence passed on the criminal Mansur Lewis is commuted to hard labour for life under Article II of the Baghdad Penal Code and it was recommended that this be reduced to 15 years hard labour counting period of detention.

I.M.A. CONFERENCE TO-DAY

Leader Abdul Karim Qassim, the Prime Minister and C-in-C. of the Armed Forces, is due to open at 10.30 this morning the third annual conference of the Iraqi Medical Association at the Amanna Hall.

The Faithful Leader will make an address to the members of the medical communities in particular and to countrymen and to the entire Arab Nation in General.

The Leader will next visit the Medical Drugs and Surgical Instruments Exhibition, the products of the Artificial Limbs Factory and the exhibitions of home made medical products. A special wing has been set for the Medicated Cotton Factory. The products of this factory have been classed among the best and the Ministry of Health was able to dispense with the importation of such products. Another wing was reserved for the products of the Pharmaceutical Materials Company which are considered of top quality.

The Ministry of Health is providing moral and material support to this factory. It is to be recalled that the Faithful Leader has often emphasised the need to give full encouragements to all those engaged in medical industries so as to work towards self-sufficiency.

The talks conducted by the three ministers are reported to have dealt with important issues pertaining to OPEC. The talks have led to complete agreement in the points of view in a manner serving the interests of the oil producing countries and safeguarding their rights. The talks are to continue until tomorrow when the Venezuelan and Saudi Ministers are due to leave for Riyadh to attend the OPEC meeting scheduled for Thursday.

The Minister of Oil gave a lunch party yesterday in honour of the two visiting ministers. He is due to give a reception in their honour at the White Palace this evening.

Chinese envoy meets Lord Home

London, Monday.

The Chinese Charge d'Affaires, Hsiung Hsiang-Hui, paid one of his rare visits today on Foreign Secretary Lord Home.

The Chinese envoy requested the meeting. He and Lord Home conferred for 35 minutes. The nature of their conversation was not revealed.

The British Government has strongly criticised the Chinese Attacks on India. Presumably the Chinese diplomat wanted to put his Government's position concerning the frontier dispute to Lord Home.

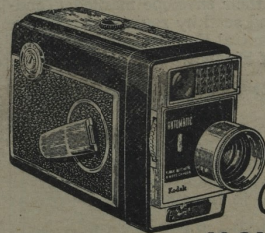

G.D.R. to buy 17,000 tons of Iraqi dates

A deal has been concluded for the sale of seventeen thousand tons of Iraqi dates of the current season to the German Democratic Republic.

The signing took place in Berlin after talks conducted by an Iraqi delegation, headed by Sayid Hamid Hassan al-Nasir, the Director General of the Dates Organisation.

The delegation had previously visited the Soviet Union and signed an agreement with the concerned authority there, for the sale of 25,000 tons of the new season dates to the Soviet Union.

People's Republic of China had concluded an agreement with the Iraq Republic, according to which Iraq will sell 70,000 tons of Iraqi dates.

The quantities of dates to be purchased by the socialist countries will total 117,000 tons; and it is expected a similar agreement will be concluded with Czechoslovakia.

Schools to prepare for celebrations

The Directorate General of Technical Affairs at the Ministry of Education, has circulated a letter to all directors of Education requesting them to instruct the schools in their areas to prepare art activities for the stage, the TV and the broadcast stations on the occasion of the Baghdad and al-Kindi millenary, the anniversary of the day of Safety and Recovery, the winter aid campaign and the victorious Army Day.

HEALTH RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED ON PASSENGERS

Dr. Mohammed al-Shawaf, the Minister of Health has issued an order imposing anti-small pox and anti-African bubonic health restriction on all passengers arriving by air, road or sea from either Iran, Pakistan and Afghanistan borders. The order states that this order is issued for the purpose of preventing the occurrence of small pox in the health quarantine under Iraqi eastern part of Iraq, namely in national regulations.

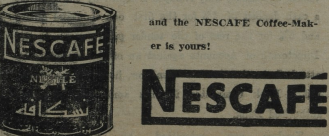

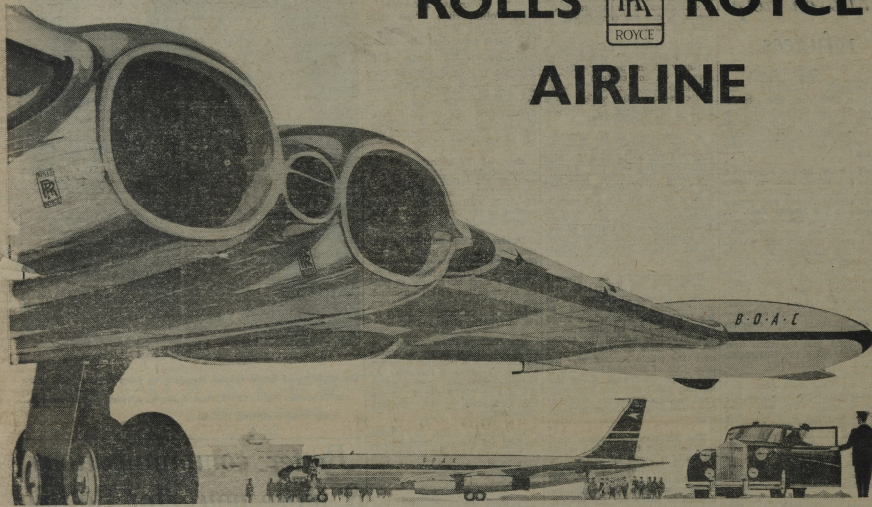

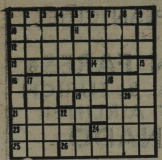

FAO PLANS DEVELOPMENT OF TURKEY'S ANTALYA REGION

ORANGES and olive oil, carpets and cottonseed, beer and building board, paper and poultry, tomatoes and tourists, are all part of a unique and complicated planning project being carried out in the Antalya region of Turkey.

The Turkish Government is trying to put a stop to the problems of erosion, flooding and inadequate drainage which plague the Antalya region; and to bring about increased agricultural production, coupled with forestry and industrial development. To this end a three-year pre-investment survey of the Antalya region is being carried out within the framework of the national development plan.

Antalya is a pleasant market town on the Mediterranean coast of Turkey where the gulf of Antalya bits into the Taurus mountains. The project area, some 36,000 square kilometres, includes the three provinces of Antalya, Burdur and Isparta, and is approximately the size of the Netherlands. The area is irregular in shape, with a base 500 kilometres in length along the coasting, reaching up, north of Lake Egridir into the Central Anatolian plateau.

Land suitable for agriculture is limited to the coastal plains and the ancient lake beds and basins which form the highland valleys. This agricultural land covers only 20 per cent of the total area, and is largely subsistence cultivation and peasant farming on smallholdings.

Conditions vary widely throughout this area. The coastal plains are capable of growing such crops as cotton, vegetables, oranges and even bananas in a few frost-free places. The north-west is eroded hilly country draining into the saline Burdur lake. The southwest is forested mountainous terrain, pocketed with small valleys and draining underground into the lower coastal plains. Here the main crops of the upland region - wheat, barley and sweetbeet - are grown. The north-east is very mountainous, well-forested but a poor farming area.

The Turkish-FAO team have proposed various possibilities for development of the region: a) expansion of irrigated areas to around two and a half times the present acreage, together with drainage improvement and land reclamation; b) more intensive use of irrigated land together with a shift to high-value, high yield crops through market gardening, orchards and vineyards, as well as mixed farming, coupled with semi-mechanisation and pest control; c) improvement of dryland agriculture and animal husbandry; d) increased forestry at production through the planting of quick-growing species and improved forestry practices, together with a better access road system and the development of forest industries; e) expansion of hydro-electric power; f) development of agricultural and mineral-based industries; and g) development of the areas as a tourist resort.

One of the major problems of the area according to Dr. Groom, the Dutch FAO manager of this project, is the extensive seasonal flooding of the rich coastal lands where the cotton, citrus and market gardening produce are grown. In biblical times this country was very productive, but the decay of the great cities of antiquity has led to a gradual deterioration of the countryside, through stripping of the forests and overgrazing followed by the inevitable erosion of the soil.

Expanding irrigated land, covering 40,000 hectares, 1 hectare equals 2.47 acres) within the Antalya region, cannot be extended beyond an additional 65,000 hectares using the available water supply states Dr. Shaw, United States agricultural economist with the team of FAO experts. The expansion of irrigated areas in addition to newly reforested areas means that the present 80,000 hectares of dryland will have to be reduced by about 80,000 hectares. However, a shift to higher-value crops and improved growing methods means that, with this reduction in area, the total value of production can be raised.

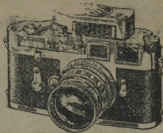

CHINESE DRIVING DEEPER INTO INDIA TAKE BOMDELA

New Delhi, Monday.

Chinese troops, attacking Indian forces in three areas, are driving deeper into India. They have now reached the point some 80 miles south of the McMahon line which India regards as her border in the north-east sector.

Word came from New Delhi today that the Chinese have captured Bomdela—the town which has a population of some 2,000—is the largest Indian community in the area. Yet, according to the Chinese, they captured it in a big offensive on October 20.

The way to Bomdela was laid open by the Chinese capture of the vital Sela Ridge—a gateway to India's oil producing Assam plains.

Indian sources, reporting on the loss of the Sela Ridge, said wave after wave of Chinese troops—an estimated 50,000 were in the area—stormed through the Indian positions. Many were shot down by the Indian defenders but more Chinese appeared to continue the attack trampling over their own dead and wounded.

Prime Minister Nehru told Parliament today of the fall of the Sela Ridge and shortly afterwards of Bomdela. Legislators greeted the announcement with shouts of anger and demands that India seek massive military aid from friendly nations. Some called for an all-out war on China.

Mr. Nehru said the capture of the Sela Ridge—at the western end of the north-east frontier area—meant that he would certainly consider a declaration of war or the closing of the Indian Embassy in Peking.

Mr. Nehru said India, in effect, is already in a full-fledged war—a kind of brutal and callous war and we are treating it as such. The Indian Prime Minister said India is trying to get all the help it can from friendly countries.

Khrushchev on industry reorganisation

Moscow, Monday.

Mr. Khrushchev today urged the Soviet Union to make use of what was profitable in capitalist countries in centralising production and design, the Tass agency reported.

The Soviet leader was outlining to the Central Committee of the Soviet Communist Party, proposals for reorganising Party control of industry, construction and agriculture.

He said that even in capitalist countries, industry, torn as it was by competition, was making extensive use of specialization and centralisation.

NIELS BOHR PASSES AWAY

Copenhagen, Monday.

Tributes flowed in today to Danish Professor Niels Bohr, one of the world's greatest atomic physicists, who died here yesterday.

Professor Bohr, who was 77, helped produce the Atom Bomb after being smuggled out of Denmark during the Second World War.

Often described as "the father of modern physics," Dr. Bohr received the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1922 for his work in investigating the structure of atoms and in 1938 proposed his theory of nuclear reaction.

He went to the United States in 1939 and worked on a theory of nuclear fission. He was forced to flee Denmark in 1943, escaping to Sweden in a fishing boat. From there he was flown to Britain.

He lived quietly after the war but in 1950 wrote an open letter to the United Nations appealing for an open exchange of information about atomic energy as a means of relaxing international tension.

While in Denmark during the war Dr. Bohr hid "heavy" water—key material in the development of the atomic bomb—from the Germans by keeping it in empty beer bottles in his laboratory. It was still there after the war.

Arab Gulf ports Security measures tightened

Bahrain, Monday.

Security measures along the Arabian Gulf ports are being tightened following a recent explosion on the British India Ship Dwarka (4551 tons) between Dubai and Muscat, according to an official British spokesman here today.

The explosion, in the washroom, burned an Arab woman and child and caused some damage to the ship, according to the spokesman.

"The British authorities have impressed on port officials the necessity of strengthening security all along the line, although this matter is the responsibility of individual governments," he said in the Gulf.—Reuter.

He set no date for nationalisation, but said these and other vital sectors of the economy will, without any doubt, become of the state.

Sayid Ben Bella called for foreign investment. "Our aims are Socialist," he said, "but Socialism cannot be created in a few months or in a few years."

He told newsmen there would be three sectors in the Algerian economy—the public sector which would include all vital industries, the semi-public sector, where the state would participate, and a private sector.

The Algerian Premier also renewed his pledge to uphold agreements with France. He said Foreign Minister Mohammed Akhmed, will go to Paris soon to discuss problems connected with Franco-Algerian cooperation.

Sayid Ben Bella added that the government was about to begin, at the end of the month, a wide-spread campaign to build and rebuild villages. The main idea he said is to create new villages on large farms.
