

PREFACE


Throughout the year the National Statistical Department issues various statistical reports analysing data obtained by the National Statistical Department through surveys and collected from various Ministries and Departments. The purpose of these reports is to present basic facts and figures to provide a sound basis for the study of significant features concerning Oman and its people. It is our hope that statistical analyses of prevailing social and economic conditions will demonstrate the current course of national development and illuminate the vast potential for the future. To publicise these findings in a single up-to-date report the Department annually issues a Statistical Year Book.

This second Year Book presents data collected since the accession of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Sa'id, the builder of the new, modern Oman, on July 23rd 1970 and up to the end of 1973. Development in Oman is progressing at such a rapid pace that statistics compiled previously are fast becoming out of date.

There are still many gaps in the available data. The Department has endeavoured to bridge these gaps and to improve the quality of available statistics. Efforts are now being made to conduct socio-economic surveys, including cost of living and family expenditure surveys and, with the help of the United Nations and its various organizations, to prepare for a national census of population and to initiate a comprehensive agricultural survey.

The National Statistical Department wishes to express its thanks to all Government Ministries and Departments, and to others who have helped in preparing this Year Book. The Department welcomes any suggestions to improve and broaden the scope of the statistical material for subsequent Year Books.

The National Statistical Department hopes that the second Year Book will meet, to a large extent, the needs of planners, research workers and other interested persons and that it reflects the spectacular progress made in Oman under the able guidance of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Sa'id.

GENERAL FEATURES

1. GEOGRAPHICAL FEATURES

The Sultanate of Oman occupies most of the south-eastern corner of the Arabian Peninsula and has a coast line stretching almost 1700 km. from the Straits of Hormuz in the north to the frontier with the People's Democratic Republic of Yemen. The Musandam Peninsula, the northern-most point of Oman, is separated from the main body of the Sultanate by a strip of territory which is part of the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

Oman is located between latitudes 16°40'N and 26°20'N and longitudes 51°50'E and 59°40'E.

2 POPULATION

No population census has so far been carried out in Oman and precise population figures are not available. For planning purposes the population is assumed to be 1 500 000.

3 GEOGRAPHICAL AREAS

Geographically, Oman falls into a number of distinct areas:

Musandam

The isolated northern province consists of rugged mountains rising up to 1800 m. in height from a deeply indented fjord coast line. The principal villages are Khasab, Bayah and Bukha.

Batinah

The Batinah plain runs from the frontier with the UAE for a distance of some 270 km. south east almost to Muscat. It is situated between the coast and the Western Hajar, varying from 10 to 30 km in width. Cultivation is limited to a narrow strip, seldom wider than 3 km., adjacent to the sea. The Batinah is one of the most populous areas of Oman and the main towns are Barka, Masnaa, Suwaiq, Khabura, Saham, Sohar, Liwa and Shinas.

Capital Area

Muscat and Mutrah, traditionally the principal cities of Oman, are expanding fast to include the areas of Ruwi, Sidab, Rawdah, Bustan, Bawshar and as far as Sib at the southern end of the Batinah plain.

Western Hajar

The mountain range parallel to the Batinah stretches from the border with the UAE in the north to the Sumail Gap in the south. The highest points are in the south-east, the Jebel al Akhdar with peaks approaching 3,000 m. in height. There are groups of major settlements on each side of the Western Hajar. Those to the south make up the area known as Oman Proper while the main towns on the seaward side of the mountains are Rostaq, Awabi and Nakhl.

Eastern Hajar

The Eastern Hajar is the continuation of the main mountains of Oman from the Sumail Gap to Jebel Khamis in the east, a distance of just over 200 km. To the north the mountains reach the sea and to the south they are bordered by the Sharqiya and the Jaalan. The highest elevation is 2100 m. The principal towns on the seaward edge of the mountains are Sur, Tiwi and Quriyat.

Dhahirah

This is a semi-desert plain, sloping from the southern flanks of the Western Hajar into the Rub al Khali. It is bordered to the north by Jau and Buraimi and to the south it is divided from Oman Proper by Jebel al Kawr. The major settlements are on two principal wadis, the Wadi Dank and the Wadi al Ain, the towns being Dank, Ibri and Yanqal.

Jau and Buraimi

The northern extension of the plain of Dhahirah is known as Jau. In this small area between the border of the UAE and the Western Hajar population is concentrated around the irrigated date cultivation of the Buraimi oasis.

Oman Proper

This is a central plateau sloping from the Jebel al Akhdar in the north towards the desert in the south. It is bounded on the west by the Dhahirah and on the east by the Sharqiya. There are four principal valleys: Wadi Kabir, Wadi Halfain, Wadi Bahla and Wadi Sumail. The Wadi Halfain and the Wadi Sumail together form a natural gap in the main mountain range. This gap is a traditional route between Muscat and the Interior, as well as being one of the most populous areas of Oman. The main towns are Nizwa, Bahla, Izki, Manah, Adam and Sumail.

GENERAL FEATURES

Sharqiya

The Sharqiya is an area of sandy plains and valleys, lying on the inland side of the Eastern Hajar, bordered to the south east by the district of Jaalan and to the south by the Wahiba sands. The main towns are Ibra, Mudaibi, Samad, Biddiyah and Mudairib

Jaalan

The Jaalan is a sandy plain forming the southern extension of the Sharqiya and extending to the Arabian Sea. It is bordered on the northern side by the Eastern Hajar and on the southern side by the Wahiba sands. The main towns are Bilad Bani Bu Ali, Bilad Bani Bu Hasan, Wafi and Kamil.

Masirah and Kuria Muria Islands

The island of Masirah, almost 60 km. long, is situated in the Arabian Sea. The other important islands, also in the Arabian Sea, are the Kuria Muria group, the largest of which is Hallaniya.

Dhofar

The southern province occupies almost one third of the area of the country. Dhofar is composed of two different climatic zones. The coastal plain, extending from Raysut in the west past Salalah, is nowhere wider than about 8 km. but the fertile alluvial soil is well watered between June and September by the south-west monsoon. The monsoon also reaches the wooded hills reaching up to 1500 m. in elevation behind the coastal plain. North of the mountains and extending to the border with Saudi Arabia in the Rub al Khali there is very little rainfall and the area has desert vegetation. The main towns and villages are Salalah, Marbat, Taqa, Thamarit, Rakhuyut and Mukhshin.

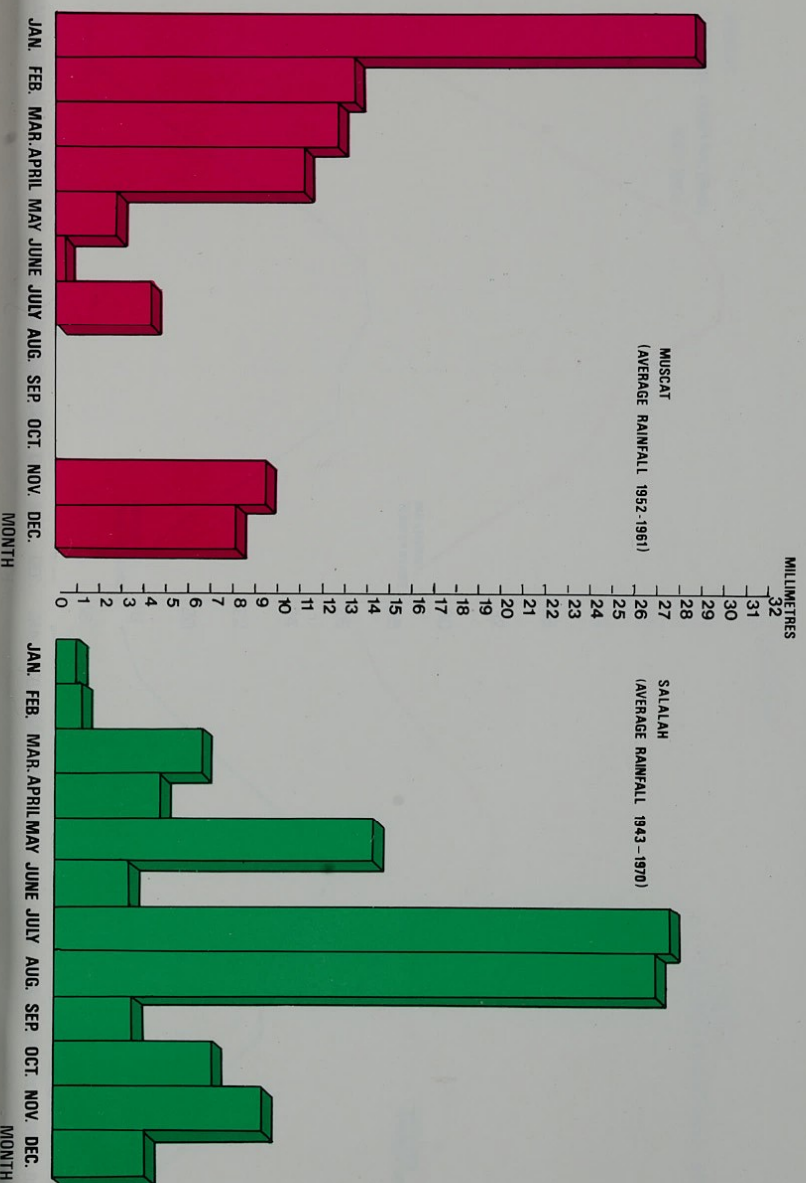
RAINFALL

1. To compensate for the short period of data availability, monthly average rainfall figures for Muscat have been calculated by taking each month's figure over the ten-year period, adding to it one half of the previous month's figure and one half of the subsequent month's figure, and dividing by two. The ten-year averages were then calculated based on these adjusted figures.
2. The Salalah figures for monthly average rainfall are based on a twenty-eight-year period and no adjustments were necessary.

TEMPERATURE AND HUMIDITY

1. Muscat figures for monthly maximum and minimum temperatures and relative humidity are based on ten-year averages of absolute monthly maxima and minima.
2. The Salalah figures are based on mean daily maximum and minimum temperatures, with a twenty-eight-year average calculated for each month.
3. Salalah relative humidity figures are based on readings taken at 0300 hrs and 1200 hrs.

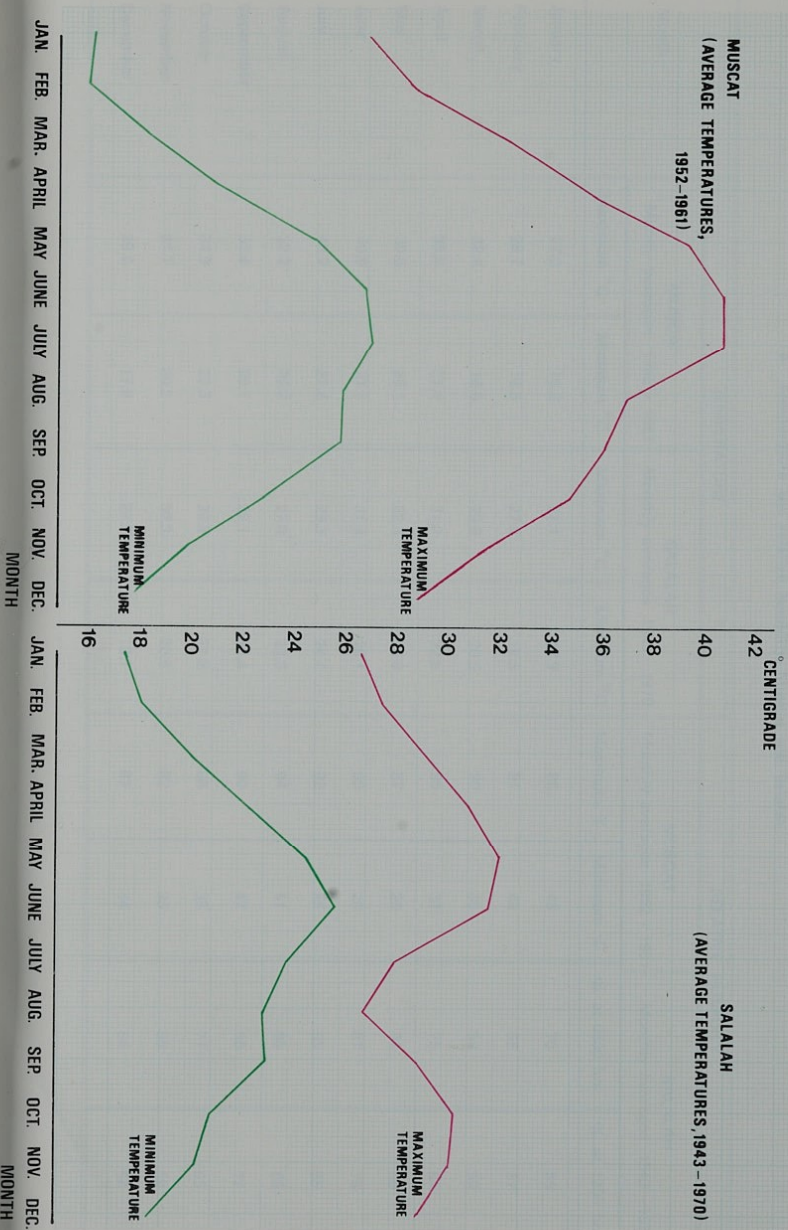

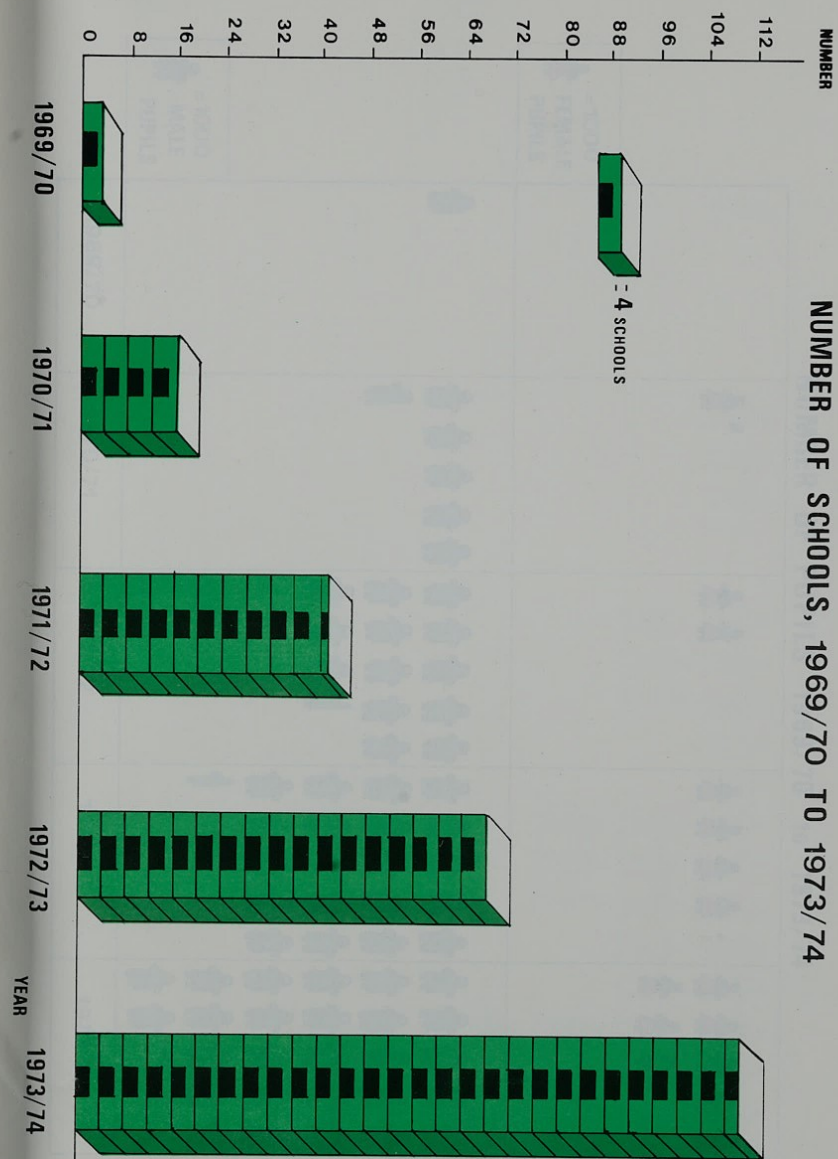
1. Data in respect of schools, pupils and teachers relate to the Government educational institutions only.

4. Technical education is provided by the Mutrah Technical School. The school runs two-year courses to City and Guilds standards. The minimum qualification for admission is a pass from primary school.











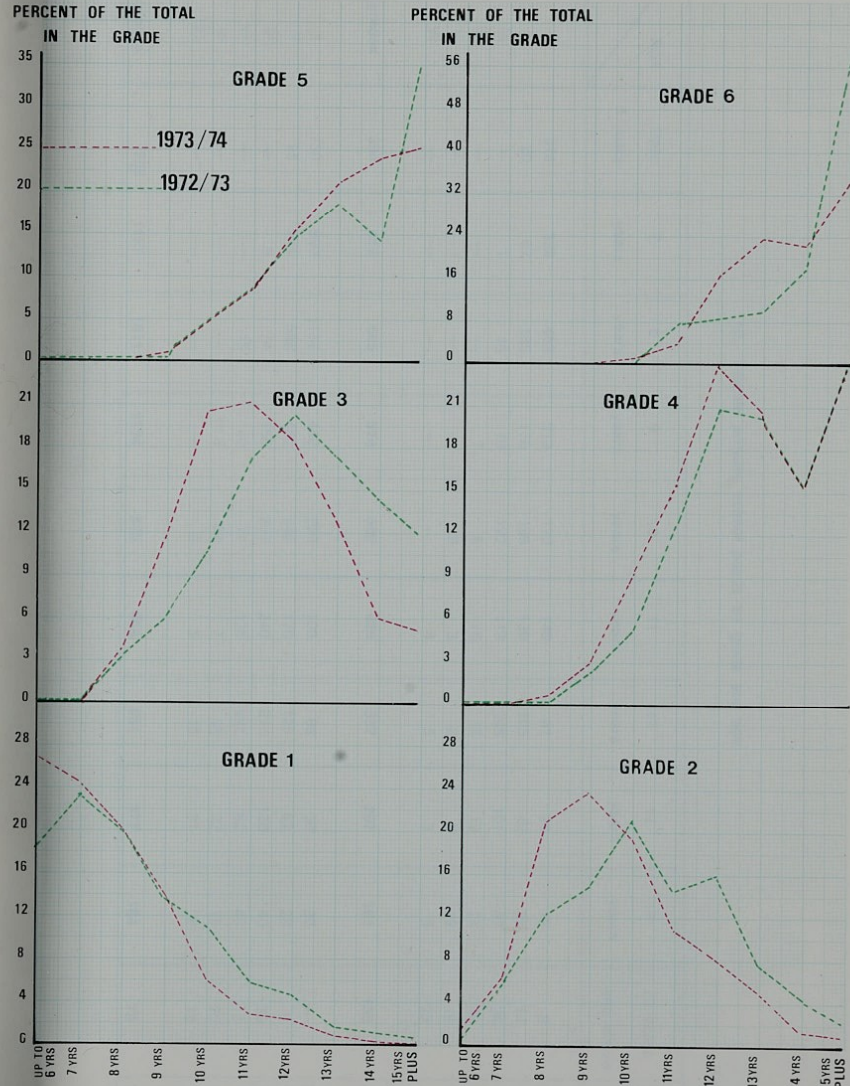

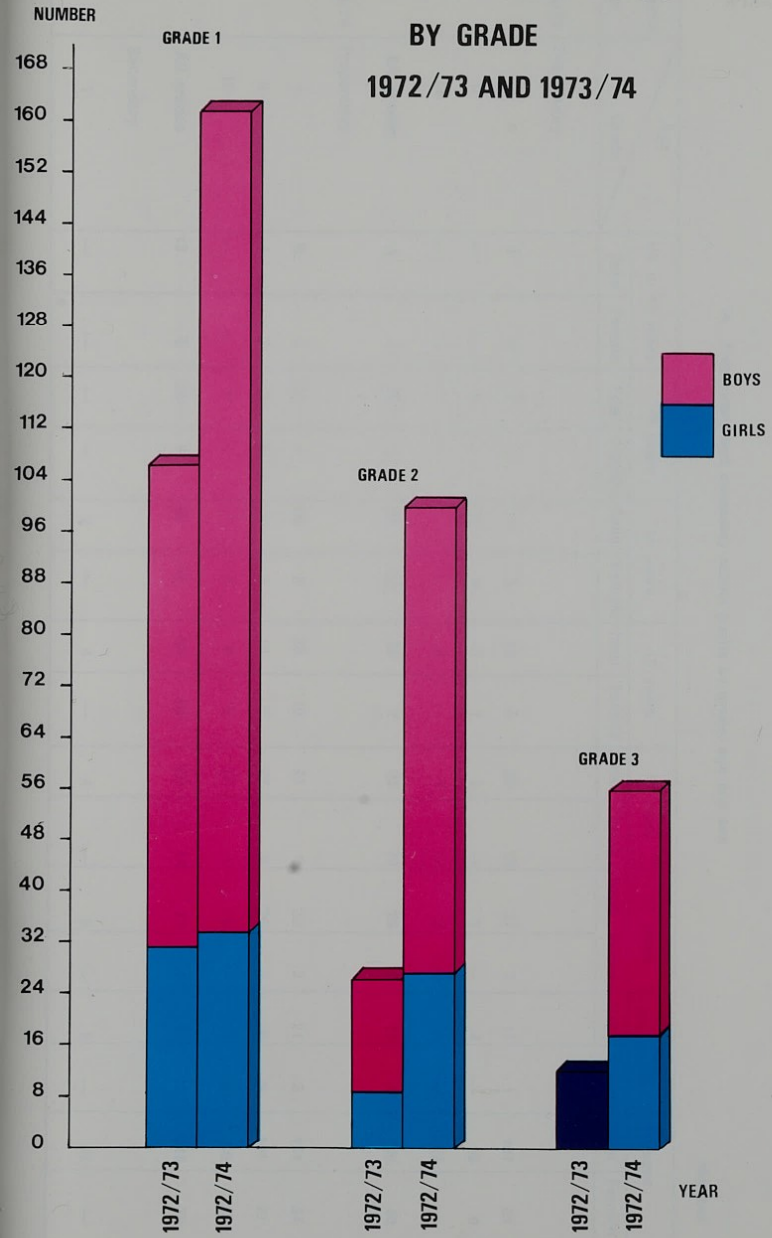

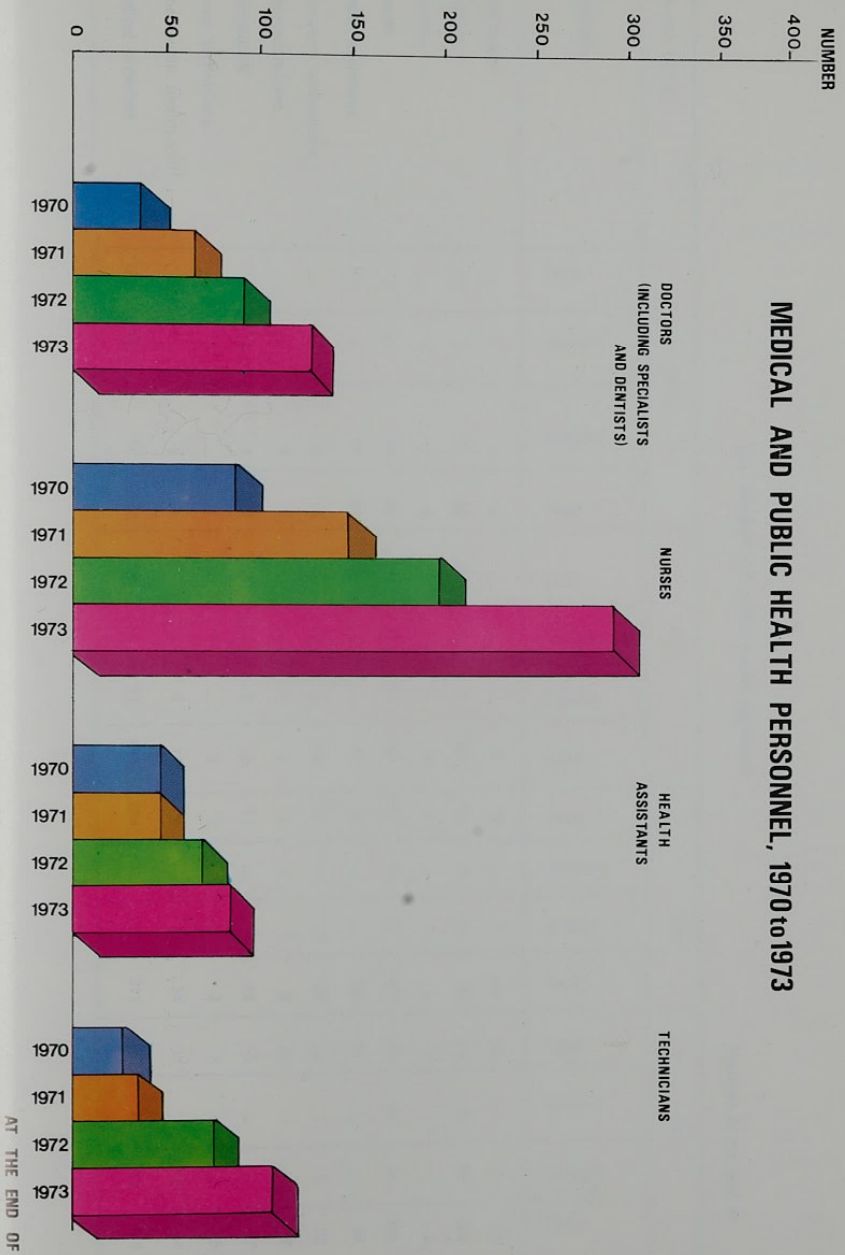

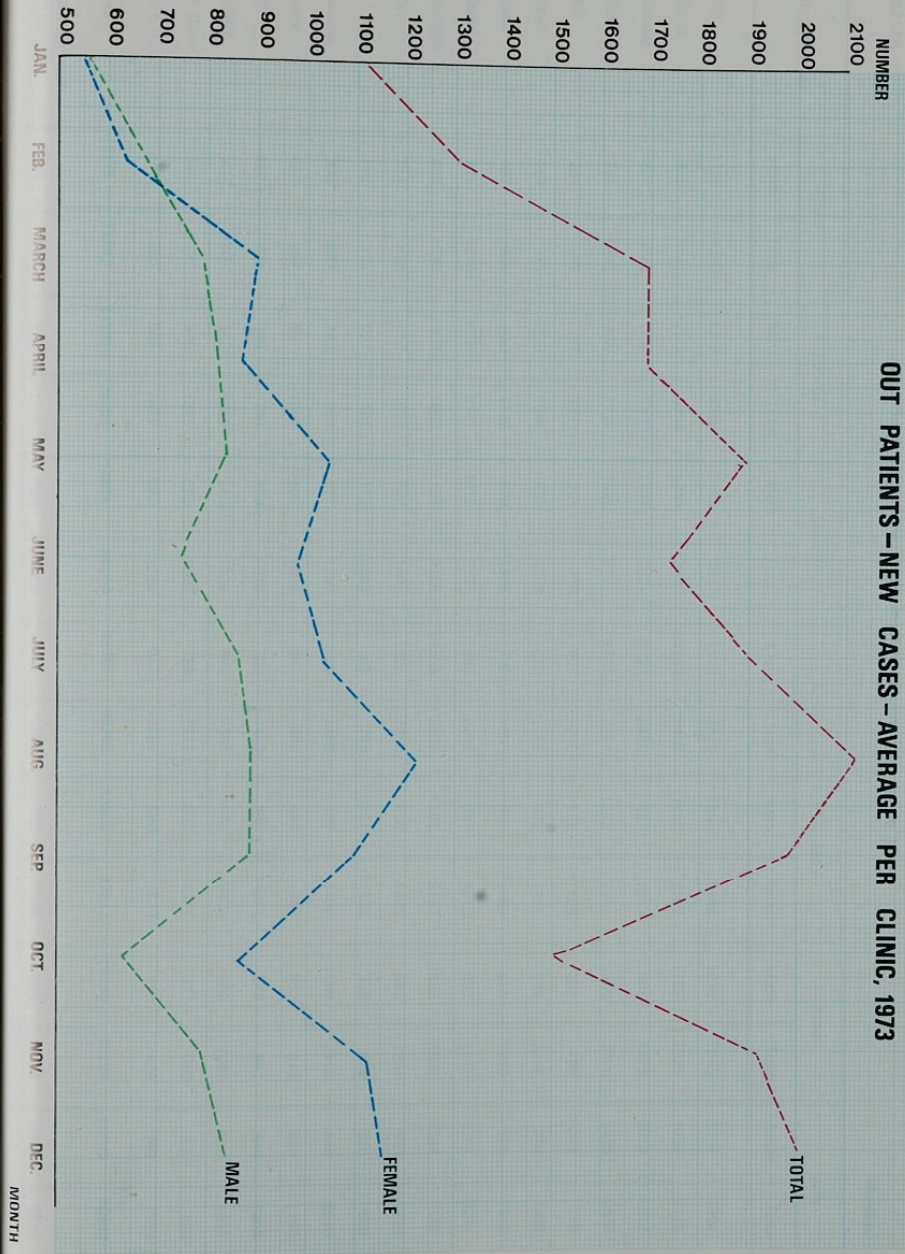

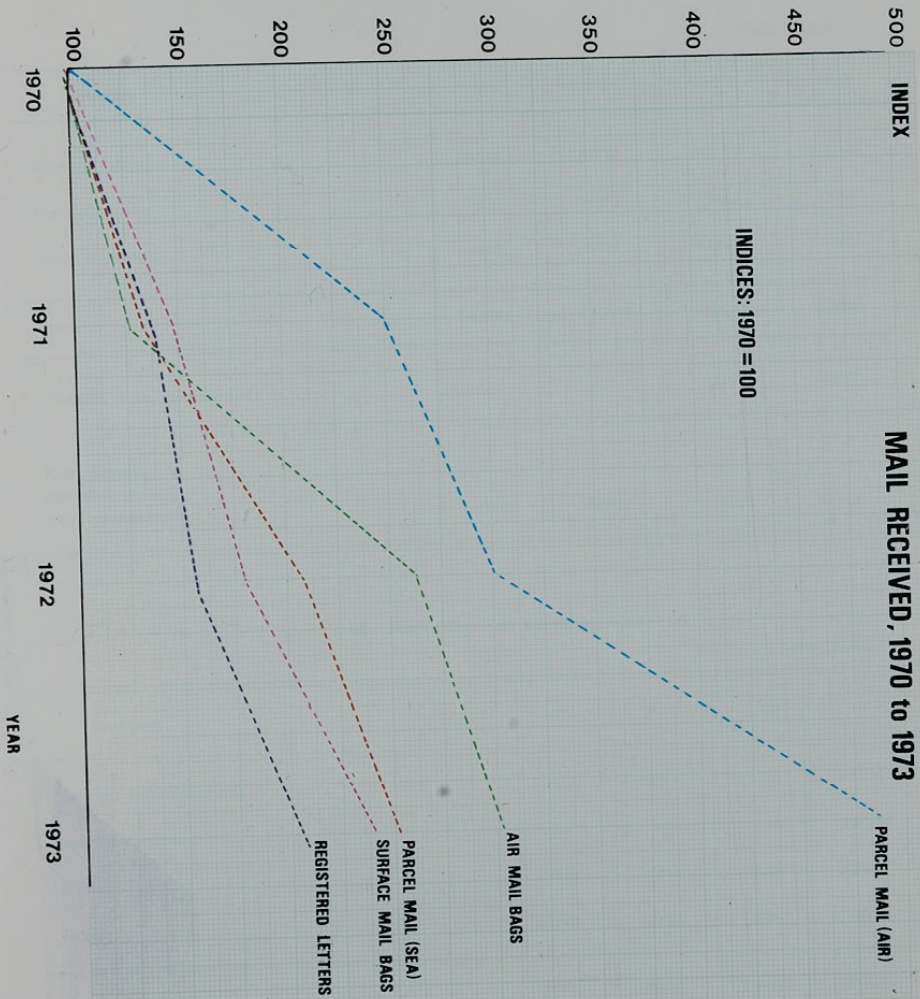

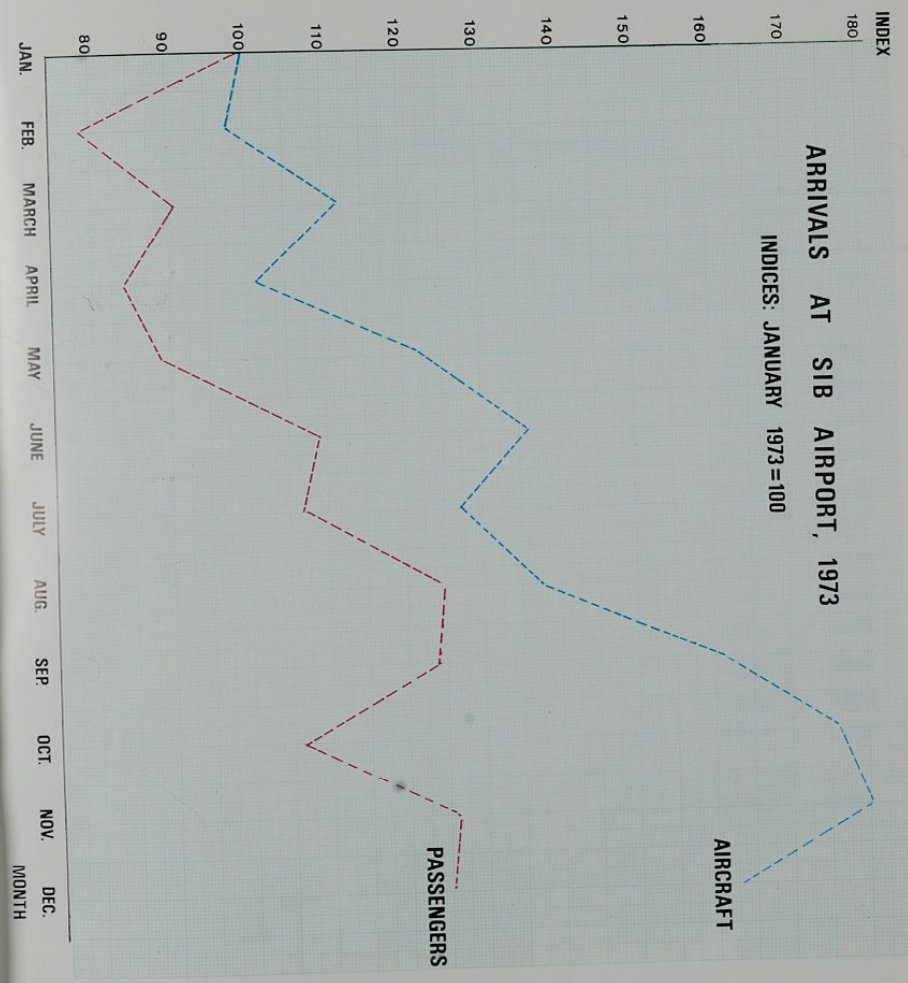
DEPARTURES FROM SIB AIRPORT, 1973

INDICES: JANUARY 1973=100



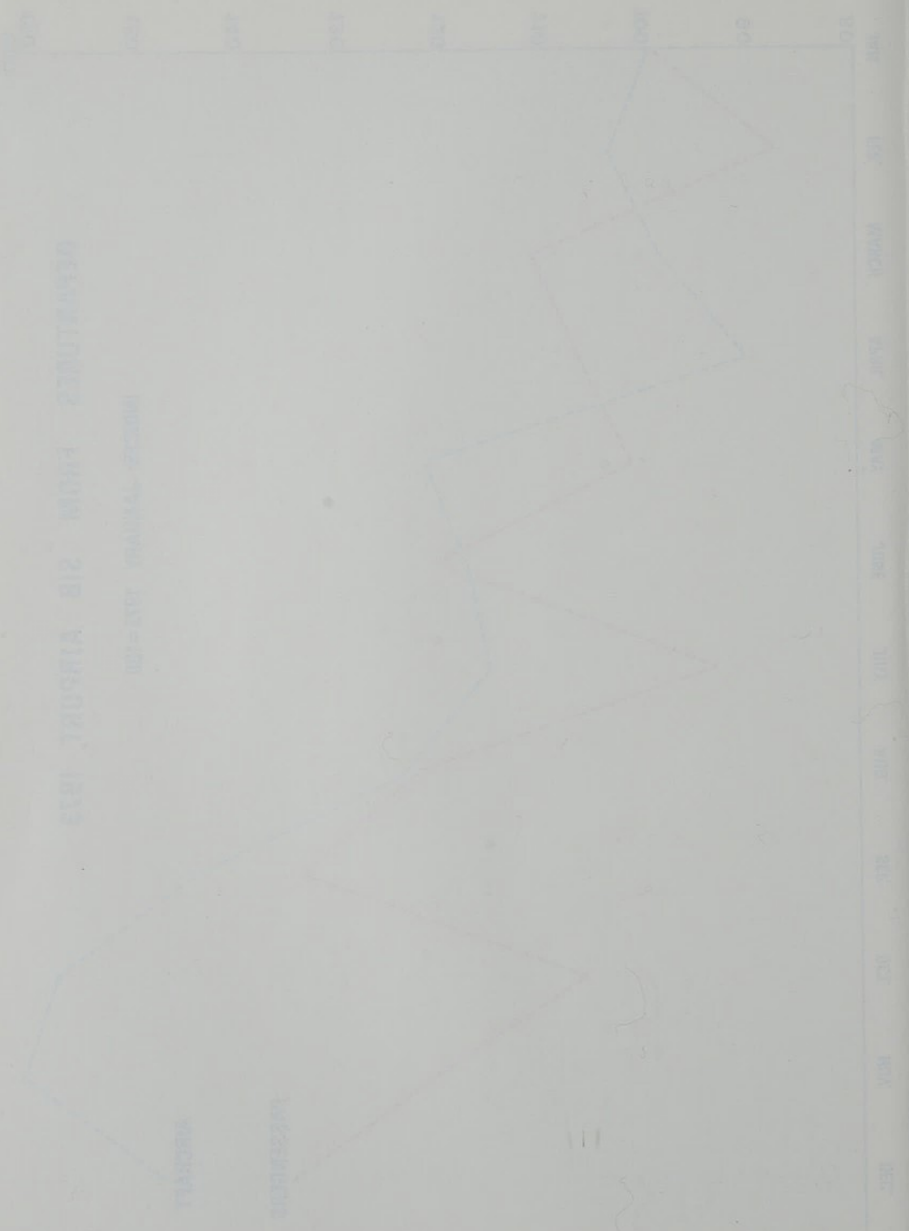
ARRIVALS AT SIB AIRPORT, 1973

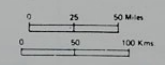

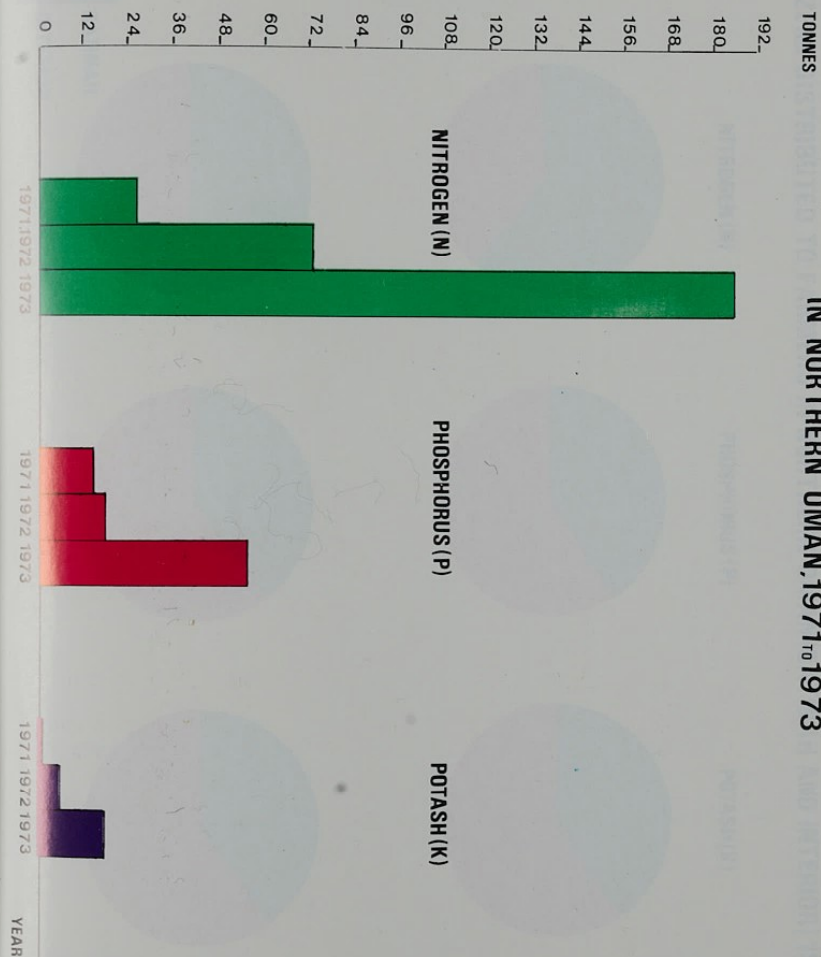

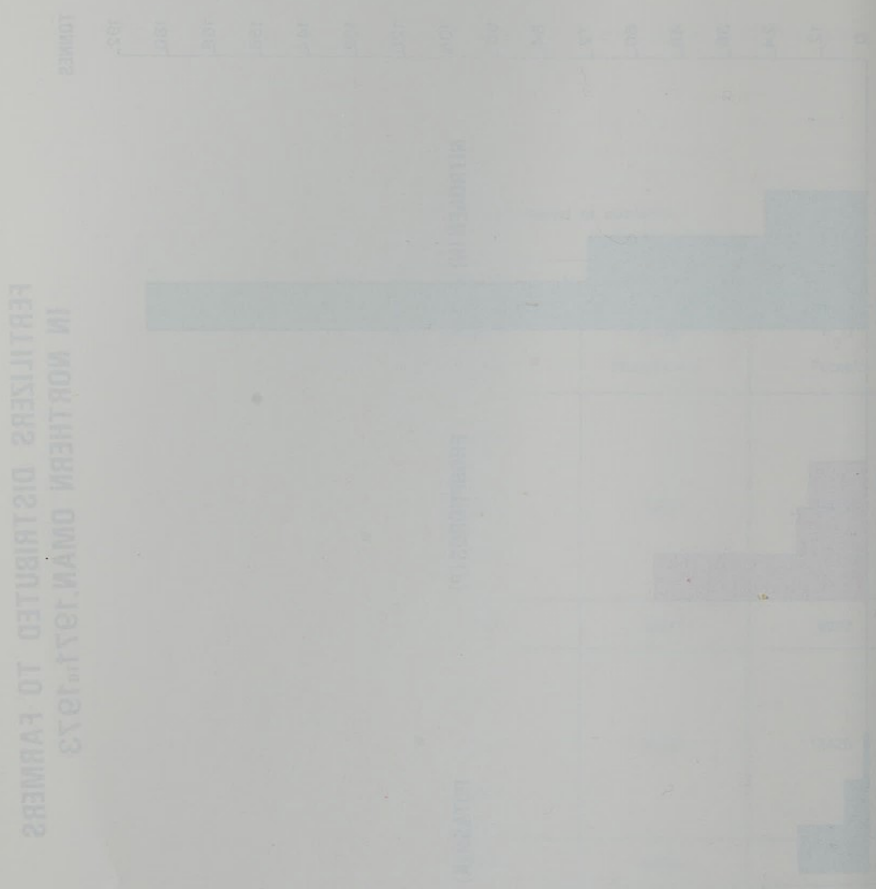
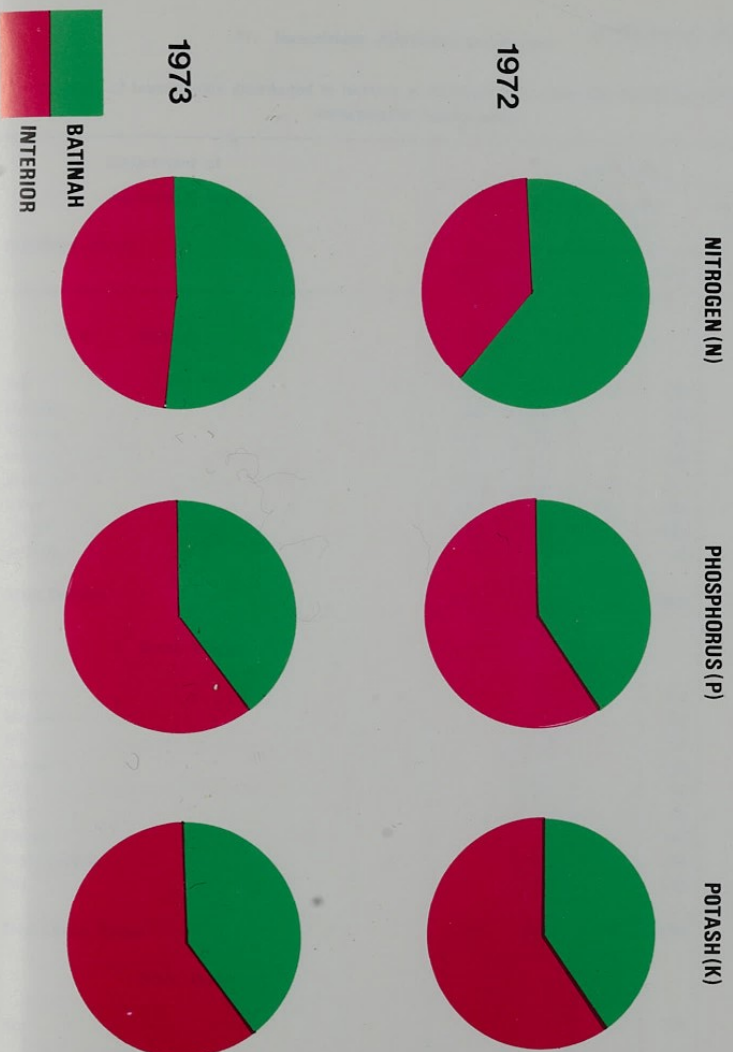

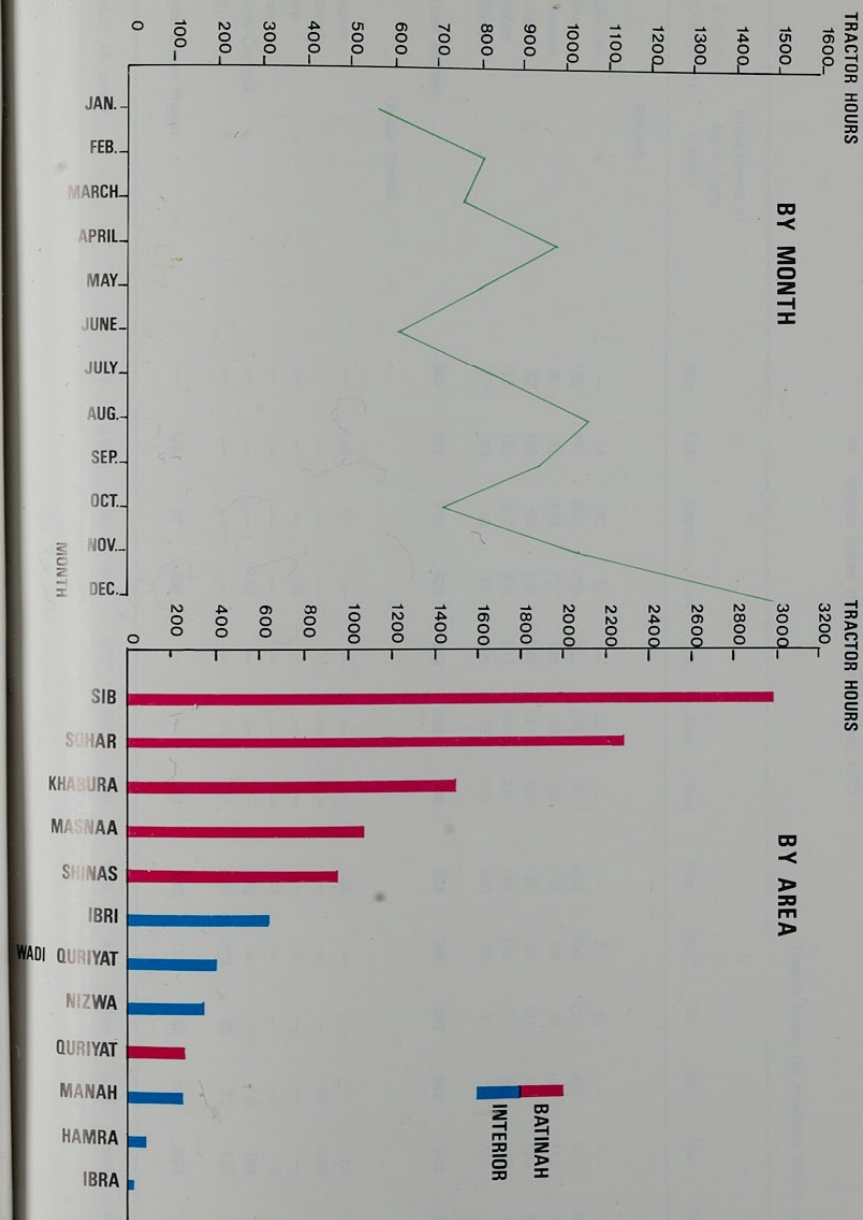

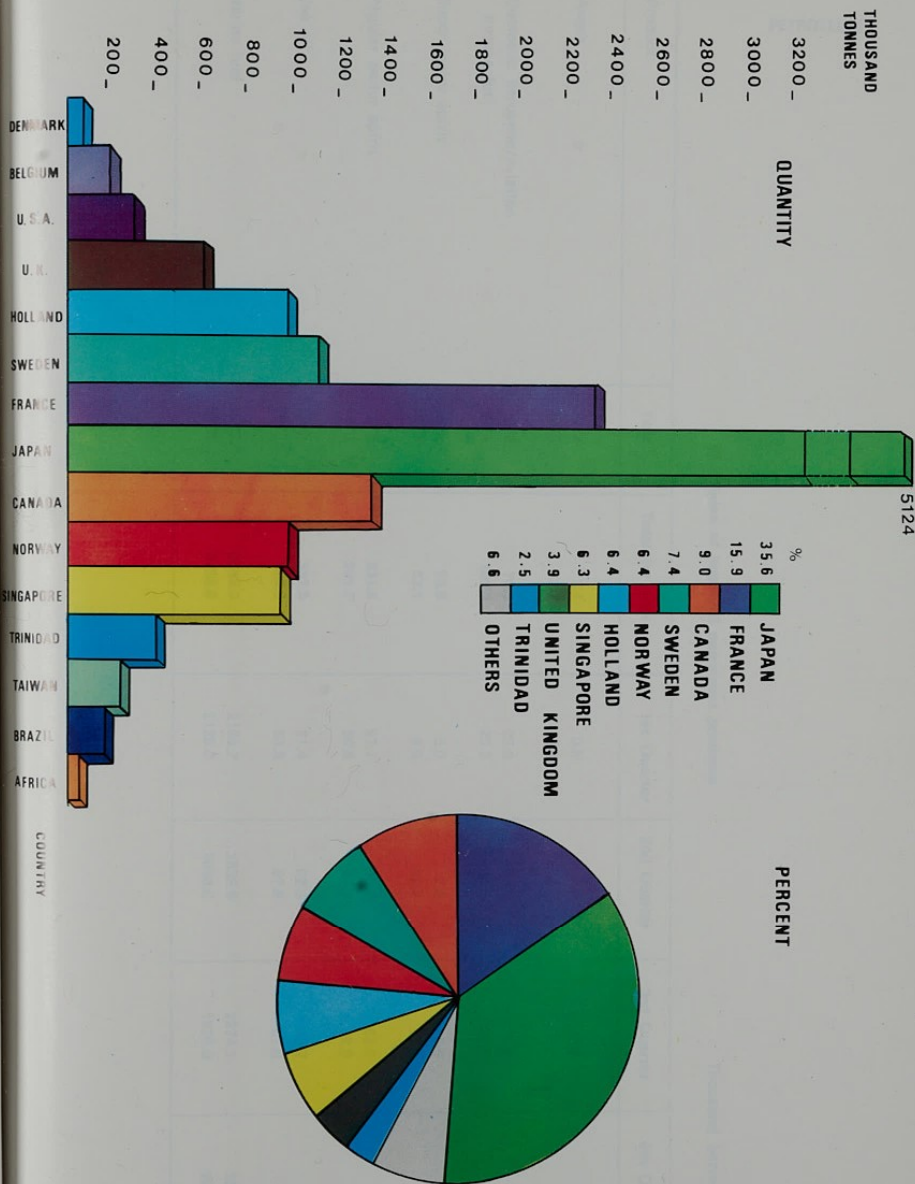

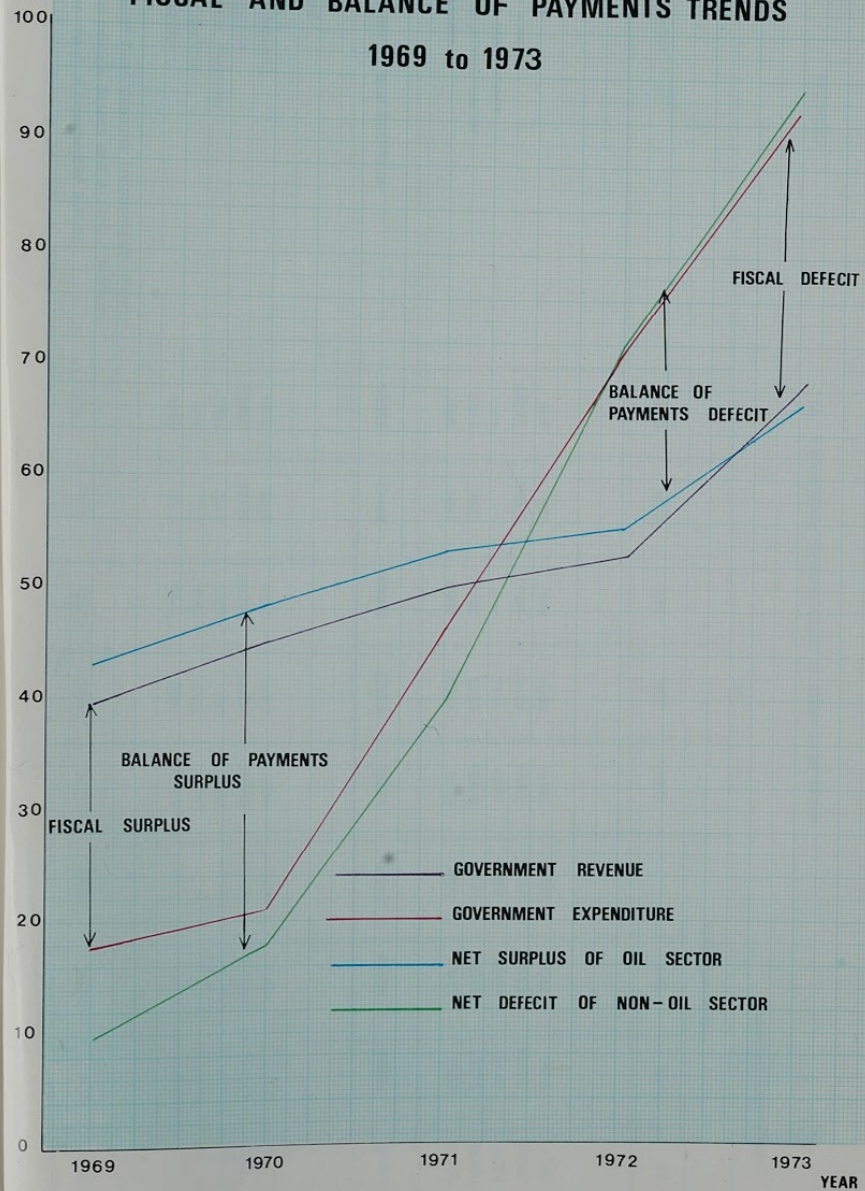
